Our Mission

About This Report

The Springfield Public School District is fully committed to open, two-way communication with staff, parents of our students, and all citizens who are concerned about education. Our continuing commitment to meet that goal is the reason for this, and previous, annual reports.

In this report, you will find information about many aspects of school life, from the bricks and mortar of individual school buildings to the academic achievements and programs that help every student become productive.

This annual profile of our district has been produced every year since 1986 and was expanded in 1996 to meet state public reporting requirements for all school districts in Missouri. The report includes student enrollment numbers, attendance figures, and high school dropout rates. Also included are data about the amount of state and federal aid received by our district, the number of students who qualified for free and reduced lunches, the length of the school day and year, and information about course offerings. In addition, tax information and statistics about teaching and administrative staff, average salaries earned, and percent with advanced degrees are also provided for individual school buildings within the district.

Additional state requirements in 2002 initiated the production of individual report cards for each school building in the district. These "school report cards" contain much of the data published in the annual report, plus additional information. School report cards are available at each school building, at institutions such as public libraries, and are available on the Web at www.spstoday.com.

Schools prepare students to reach their full potential and strive to meet community needs against a backdrop of human circumstances and demographic realities. 





Class-Size Reduction

In 1999-2000, Springfield Public Schools received federal funding of \$604,123 (\$531,013 for salaries and \$73,110 for employee benefits) to hire fifteen new teachers for Grades 1-3. In 2000-2001, federal funding increased to \$641,076, which provided funding to hire an additional four teachers. In 2001-2002, federal funding increased to \$802,381, which provided funding to hire three additional teachers. Funding for one more teacher was allocated in 2002-2003, bringing the total of the federal funding to \$860,622, for salaries and benefits.

School Districts in Missouri Where More Than 100,000 People Live

Out of the 524 public school districts in Missouri, only three—the St. Louis, Kansas City, and Springfield public school districts—have a resident population that exceeds 150,000. Among the three largest districts in the state, only the Springfield Public School District is fully accredited.

In addition to the three districts in the state with more than 150,000 residents, six districts fall within the 100,000 – 150,000 population range. These include the St. Louis suburban districts of Parkway, Hazelwood, Rockwood, and Francis Howell, plus the North Kansas City and Columbia school districts.

The nine school districts in Missouri with more than 100,000 residents vary in geographic location within the state, but there are also great differences in poverty rates, levels of income, and other demographic measures. For example, Census 2000 data shows median income in the Rockwood district to be \$78,655, compared to \$32,838 in the Springfield district. Four of these nine districts—St. Louis, Kansas City, Columbia, and Springfield—have more than 13 percent of their population living in poverty. The remaining five districts have fewer than six percent living in poverty.
